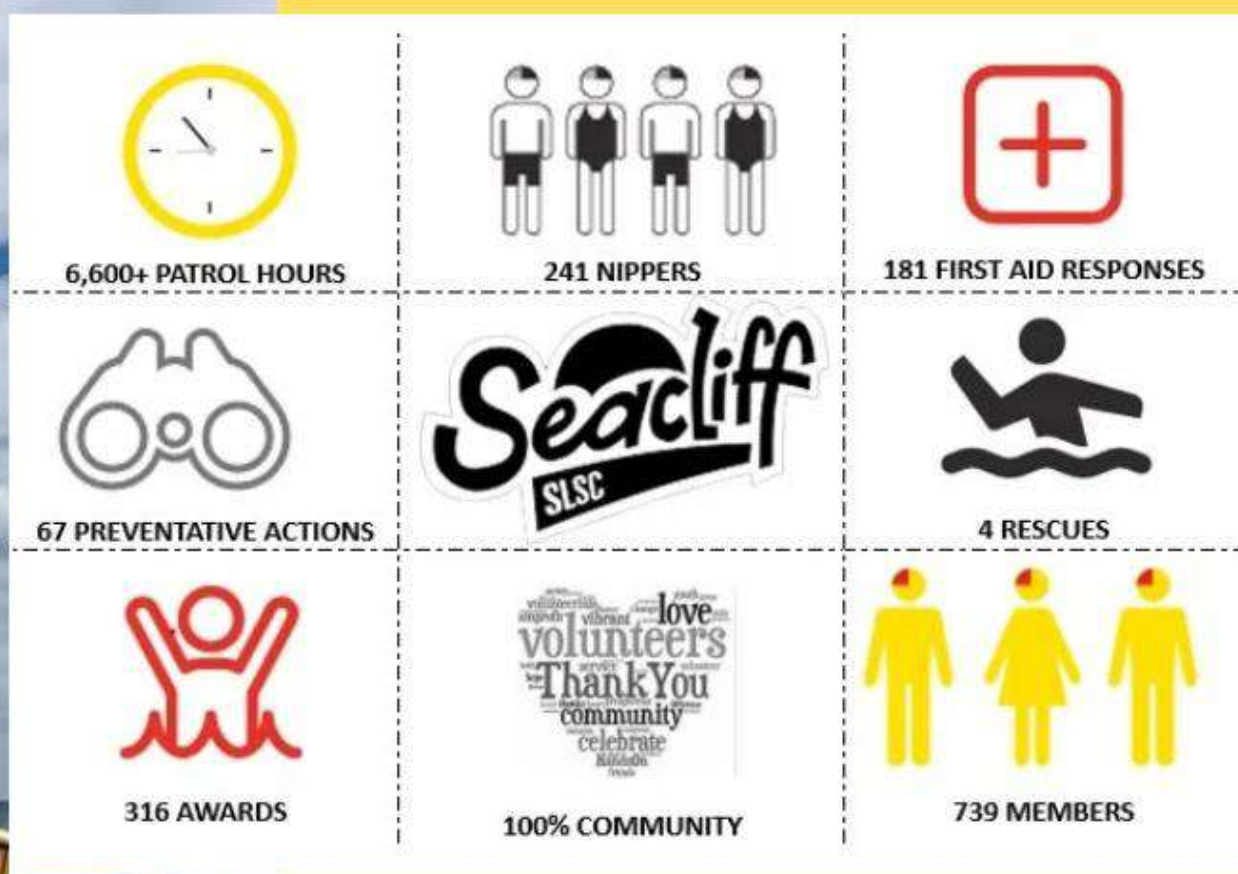

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



As we reflect on the 2024/2025 season, I am proud to present the annual report to the members of Seacliff SLSC and the broader community, including sponsors and stakeholders. It is with great pride that I extend my heartfelt thanks to all members, volunteers and the broader community.

Firstly, to acknowledge and thank the patrolling members who have contributed over 6,600 patrol hours during season 24/25 ensuring the beach users and community who frequent Seacliff beach go home safely.

I also extend my thanks to all the members, sponsors and stakeholders for the continued engagement of Seacliff SLSC in every way that people contribute to the club and activities. Any contribution to the club is appreciated and we value the relationships with our sponsors to continue to develop and invest in our members.

This season there were many new faces on the Management Team, so there was a lot to learn, discuss and consider with the new members bringing fresh ideas and enthusiasm to the roles.

To the Management team, trainers and instructors, sub committees, coaches & AGLs, the many hours of voluntary time that is contributed behind the scenes is outstanding and valued by the members. This contribution ensures we can meet our obligations and continue to provide the resources to deliver safe and successful programs this season and into the future.

At the start of the season, we had restricted access to the beach from the patrol tower as Council finished the upgrades to the amenities building, it was worth the waiting and the new ramp provided safer access for our patrol team, easier access to the beach for the community and long overdue amenities. Seacliff is committed to providing a safe and inclusive environment rolling out the beach access mat to facilitate beach access for the entire community. Our patrol members continued to support and assist everyone onto the beach, something we should all be very proud of. It is fantastic to see the enjoyment of the community getting onto the beach using the access mat, using the mobi-chairs in the water, and our patrol members helping out & assisting whenever the opportunity presents. There was an increase in usage this season which we hope will increase over the coming seasons.

Patrols and Member Contributions

The backbone of Seacliff SLSC is our incredible patrol members, and it was another great season. The patrol captains supported teams who patrolled the beach with

professionalism & teamwork providing a total of over **6,600 patrol hours** patrolling Seacliff Beach. Our patrol teams conducted **4 rescues**, provided **67 first aid responses**, and managed over **180 preventative actions** to reduce risks and injuries.

We thank our patrol captains, team leaders, and all patrol members who stepped up to keep our beaches safe and welcoming, the core business of our club. Hayley, as Vice-Captain Patrols again did an outstanding job with the rostering, communication and ongoing support of the patrol teams.

Zac took on the Chief Instructor role and worked with the training & instruction team ensuring our patrol members were proficient and had opportunities to increase their skills and gain new awards. The team ran a bulk proficiency which was well received by the members and a fun way to undertake the proficiencies.

Well done to Zac and all the instruction team for ensuring our members are skilled and confident to undertake patrols and water cover.

At Seacliff, we pride ourselves on being an active and inclusive member of our local community. This season, we continued our efforts to engage with both the local residents and visitors who frequent Seacliff Beach. Through events such as the Nipper Program, VacSwim, Surf Babies & the Suneden Water Safety Program we were able to connect with hundreds of people, educating them about water safety and building stronger relationships within our community.

A subcommittee worked through the process to implement change in our Bistro and Deb Jamieson was well assisted to make recommendations to the Management Team and in April we formally engaged & welcomed David Elmes to operate the Bistro. There were some changes to the décor and furniture, and it has been a really positive start, we look forward to the initiatives David will bring. Also, I would like to acknowledge & thank Jamie Bevis for the input and contribution he made working with the subcommittee.

New to the role of Secretary, Jianna brought extensive experience in governance and has been keeping us on track to ensure meetings are well prepared and tasks allocated. This was a big role and there were some reassignments of tasks and discussion to ensure issues were attended and reallocated as required. We were well assisted with Heather Burns who continues to assist with WWCC processes, and we are really grateful for the ongoing support Heather provides to ensure our members have the required checks

AC stepped into the role of Vice President and has been a sound voice assisting with various situations throughout the season, there is a lot of work to do in the Grants & Sponsorship area and for the club to really excel in this area we need to refresh and consider different ways to approach to ensure the club continues to be gain support to provide options for our members.

We were successful in the Power of Her grant (participation stream) with the Office of Rec and Sport and look forward to rolling out opportunities that will continue to develop the girls in all pathways of SLS with the ultimate goal of retention and having fun.

As Treasurer for season 24/25 we worked quickly to transition and assist Jodie to understand the operations of the Club, she was well assisted by the Finance Sub Committee and the bookkeepers and has been providing the management team with reporting and updates on the financial situation of the club in a timely manner this season. Jodie is keen to implement some new initiatives for securing the club financially as we look towards the future and celebrating 100 years.

The communications role was well managed with Emma; there is no doubt this role is a challenge with the diversity of the club and the variety of platforms available to communicate. This season we saw an elevation of the club's presence on social media, it was professional, consistent and well utilised to share the amazing things at Seacliff SLSC. Many of our youth assisted as water cover and assistant AGLs for juniors to encourage greater participation around the club. Shauna is contributing to increasing the number of youth around the club, providing information and encouragement all season.

There were various fun member events this season presented by the social and fundraising team with our Members Rep Vicki taking the lead, she continued to put in the time and hours to ensure everyone has fun with the Ladies Day late in the season a key event. Most Saturday afternoons opening the Sandy Feet bar for our members Vicki & Bly contribute to an outlet for members to socialise and connect an important component of our club.

On the competition front it was a jam-packed season and Sarah managed to ensure competitors were aware of competitions, entered into the events both locally and interstate as well as assisting with team considerations and representation at all State events. Sarah as Competition Co-Ordinator provided timely and informative information to the members to make the processes easy.

A small team of competitors travelled to the Gold Coast for the World Titles for some tough competition. Seacliff had some great results at the local & interstate carnivals, State Titles & Aussies with particular mention to the ski paddlers who were consistent all season. The open March Past team winning Silver at Aussies was a personal highlight for me this season, an awesome team.

Bly completed another season in the role of Club Captain managing the diverse tasks and challenges that come with the role. He certainly puts in the hours around the club and his passion for the club is evident as he continues to offer support and input when required. He should also be recognised for the coaching roles that he undertakes to ensure our athletes have opportunities for board and iron training several times a week.

TREASURER'S REPORT



I am pleased to report, that the results for 2024/25 financial year were an improvement on the previous year.

This year the Management Committee continued the concerted effort to address the financial performance of the Bistro. Like most businesses, the Bistro was being impacted by rising costs and increased competition. While work was progressing on the solution, the Management Committee closely monitored the spend on other activities of the club.

Bistro Operations

Bistro income was slightly higher for the year, and with a focus on costs the overall result was an improvement of \$40,898 on 2024.

The new management arrangement for the Bistro commenced on 23 March 2025. Under the arrangement the new Manager, David Elmes, is responsible for all the costs of operating the Bistro and receives a percentage of the gross revenue. The Club remains responsible for the overheads.

Since David's commencement the Bistro has experienced a significant increase in income compared to the same period in the previous year.

The Management Committee agreed to commit \$50,000 to Bistro improvements and replacements with \$35,062 spent as at 30 April 2025.

Club Operations

Club revenue improved on the previous financial year, with a significant fundraising effort by the Fundraising Committee and the Junior Committee. Expenses were deliberately constrained resulting in a \$58,986 improvement on 2024.

National Medal

This season, several members received a National Medal, one of Australia's highest honours for sustained service.

During the Junior State Titles, Jed showed real maturity and composure while assisting with many first aid incidents, demonstrating skills and confidence well beyond his years. Sophie's a role model to her peers and is quickly becoming one of the future leaders of lifesaving at Seacliff SLSC.

Patrol Person of the Year – Derek Bawden

Derek Bawden, the Patrol Person of the Year, has been recognised for his dedication, leadership, and service, which have had an immense impact on our club. He has served as a patrol vice captain, mentoring and guiding his patrol captain this season. Derek logged an incredible 320 patrol hours—spread across rostered duties, voluntary service, RWC operations, water safety, and emergency response. He's not only a core part of Seacliff, but also stepped up to support Goolwa SLSC as a Patrol Captain and Vice Captain during a critical time for their patrol numbers. Derek's spent an incredible amount of time behind the scenes to ensure seamless lifesaving operations, and has quietly handled everything from radio repairs to IRB maintenance and carnival setup. He was the only South Australian lifesaver deployed interstate as a Swift Water Rescue Technician during the NSW floods following ex-Tropical Cyclone Alfred, spending long days supporting communities hit hardest by the disaster—a powerful example of lifesaving service at its very highest level. Derek doesn't seek the spotlight, but he's the kind of person every club relies on: capable, humble, and always willing to step in to do what needs to be done. His impact is felt not just through the hours he gives, but in the way he lifts up others around him.

SURF RACE REPORT

We got very ambitious this season and attempted to schedule 24 Surf Races – scheduling is one thing, execution is another ... due to a combination of sharks and low patrol numbers, we were only able to complete 20 Races, which actually, is still pretty good.



Once again, the 'check in & check out' system that we implemented long ago was continued this season – this has been invaluable as it has enabled us to know at all times who is participating, and who is still in the water at the finish ... this comes in really handy if we have an instance where swimmers have not 'checked out', and we are able to pinpoint who we are looking for.

The number of competitors were high again this season with a total of 139 swimmers hitting the water – the largest category by far were the Juniors with 32, the next being the Over 40's, a fair way down with 22 – very low numbers in the Over 30's & Under 19's, but some clever persuasion might see those numbers rise next season ... it was once again great however, to see the Over 60's category being passionately contested between 11 very competitive swimmers. Consequently, the actual number of swimmers participating in the Surf Race each week were very respectable, with the Christmas Half Mile attracting 54 competitors – the second Half Mile had 51, and several standard 400 metre events recorded 60 or more ... the Mile didn't break any participation records, but a good number of 45 swimmers hit the water recording some great times.

The majority of categories had the trophy being awarded to clear winners – but the Juniors were unique, where winners were separated by the points on offer in a single swim – similar to those who have taken trophies home in the past, success is all about consistency ... just turn up every week and give it all you've got.

Speaking of turning up and swimming as many Surf Races as you possibly can, our Club Constitution clearly dictates your eligibility if you are targeting one of the desirable trophies offered in the Mile (first across the line, fastest corrected time for Male & Female, youngest swimmer, oldest swimmer) – to summarise, you need to swim 3 x 400m and 1 x 800m Surf Races throughout the season to be eligible ... it's really disappointing to see someone not awarded a trophy just because they weren't eligible, so make sure you do the swims if you want to put yourself in the running.

I would like to personally thank Emma & Christopher Webb who expertly took up position at the northern end of the beach with stopwatch in hand, making sure that all swimmers have their correct time – it wouldn't have been possible to run this event

without their support ... also thanks to those who provided vital assistance when required.

The weekly Surf Race is unique where it is one of a few, if not the only, Club event where every active member can compete next to each other in a friendly, good-natured manner.

Finally, thanks to every swimmer who took to the water this season – your sportsperson like behaviour and encouraging nature towards your fellow swimmers, personally makes this weekly event a pleasure.

COMPETITION REPORT



Reflecting on the 2024/2025 season saw some continued successes in our Senior and Masters events, many firsts and some areas of development.

Once again, it was a busy and packed season with some slightly different looking formats. The season continued to show the strength and depth of surf sports competitors within Seacliff SLSC. Once again, we had good numbers of youth, senior and master competitors. across a range of disciplines from surf boat carnivals, ocean carnivals, beach. SA Surf league, IRBs, Pool Rescue and Lifesaving events.

IRBs and Pool Rescue

So technically sitting at the end of the 2023/24 season, these two events fall through the gaps given timing and when we review results. Once dominated by our Senior athletes, the Pool rescue mantle has now been taken on by our U11-U13s where we are seeing strength coming through. We finished 2nd in the overall point score behind West Beach last season; commendable against what is a formidable pool rescue club.

We had 3 athletes selected as part of the SA State team on the Gold Coast for Nationals; Taj Ward, Fletcher Luscombe and Layla Mason. Always some excitement from Taj and Fletcher breaking yet another world record in the Open Men's Line Throw and taking home the gold medal not only at State Titles, but Nationals and Worlds!!

The IRB season was a relatively calm one, weather wise, Our numbers of competitors is down on previous years and is something we are keen to rebuild as it's a great way to hone your skills in the cooler season. We also saw an SA State team at IRB Nationals for the first time in a few years and this included our own Hayley Hoskings and Georgia Warriner selected to represent Team SA on the Gold Coast.

World Lifesaving Championships

Whilst we were still shivering through winter, we saw a small team attend the World Lifesaving Championships at Kurrawa in August. The highlight would be Taj and Fletcher mixing it with international competition and once again bringing home the gold medal for a trifecta, States, National and World Line Throw champions!

Kozii Surf Series and Infront Surf League.

This season saw senior carnivals rebranded as the Kozii Surf Series; a series of 3 carnivals across the season with a finals package on carnival 3. We had some strong results across the board from Youth through the Opens securing some top placings.

Once again we had a strong representation of Seacliff competitors across all the Surf League teams this season once again, testing their skills in some challenging condition, particularly at Chiton Rocks on Day 1.

Shaw & Partners World Ocean Series (WOS) and interstate carnivals.

The WOS (formerly Summer of Surf) is gaining momentum in the Southern States. Newly rebranded, the focus has typically been on the big point events at Manly, Shannon Eckstein and Maroochydore Classics, but the introduction of the Southern States Showdown also provides athletes the chance to compete across Vic and SA with points awarded and a winner crowned at the end of the season.

With increased prize money on the line, for those willing and able to travel they experienced some great interstate carnivals from Warrnambool, over to Manly Freshwater and up to the Gold Coast for the Coolangatta Gold, Shannon Eckstein Classic and the Maroochydore classic. These events give our athletes greater exposure to some strong racing against interstate competitors and a chance to shine on a national stage.

YOUTH COORDINATOR'S REPORT



My first season as Youth Coordinator was both challenging and incredibly rewarding. While working with teenagers has its ups and downs, I truly cherished every moment. My main goal was to create a safe, welcoming environment where young people could train, build friendships, and simply enjoy themselves.

We welcomed a small but wonderful group of new under-14s, and had some of the dedicated under-17's who were eager to be involved—and I certainly wouldn't have wanted it any other way. This season, we were fortunate to have the Tucker boys join us – Jordon, Axel and Zac. Known for their outstanding swimming skills, they are, above all, genuinely lovely young people. We also had Minami, MacKenzie, and Beatrice join the group, with Beatrice staying for a short time as an exchange student from Italy.

This group of youth are some of the most remarkable young people I've ever met. Nearly all were involved with the Juniors, giving back to the community that has given them so much. We had four AGL assistants—Stazi, Evie, Izzy, and Jed—while those not assisting were often providing water cover and encouraging the nippers around the swim and board courses.

Training looked a little different this year, with separate youth board sessions held during the week to encourage participation without the pressure of competition, focusing instead on technique, skill-building and fitness.

Our Open Day kicked off with fantastic energy. The youth were spread across the beach, supporting AGLs, providing water cover, cooking some sausages, and running a hugely successful second-hand merchandise stall.

Competition days also had a new rhythm this season, with all events held on Saturdays. The Kozii Series began at Aldinga with calm ocean conditions, offering a gentle introduction to the season. The next event at Goolwa featured big, challenging waves that had some questioning whether to enter—but they faced their fears and excelled. The series concluded at Moana with individual finals, where Keeley earned an impressive overall second place for U15 female's, followed by exciting team events.

The Ocean Summer Series took part of our group across the border to Warrnambool, Victoria. It was an amazing experience for all the girls—no boys attended! They gained valuable experience competing against clubs from around Australia, as well as fellow

South Australians, in varied conditions. Their highlight? The flying fox! The team bonding and shared experiences were truly the most rewarding parts.

In the new year, Phoebe travelled to Torquay to compete in The Jim Wall Classic against strong competition. Well done, Phoebe!

The interstate trips throughout the season fostered tremendous growth and experience for the youth. As well as these carnivals, they also competed in two Ocean Summer Series events hosted in South Australia. Glenelg's event was a fun and exciting day, albeit with a few lessons learned: Lesson one—girls, stay close to the marshalling area so you don't miss your race! Lesson two—Jordon, don't go injuring whilst yourself chasing national swimming times and just before your ski trip to Japan!

The final Ocean Series event took place at Brighton. The "M" course was less popular with the group, involving more wading than swimming or board paddling. However, the highlight was securing first place in the mixed Cameron event.

As the carnivals wrapped up, the youth shifted focus to the season's championships, starting with the Rescue Championships. Taking first place in RnR in the five-person event was almost expected given their extensive training in both five-person and two-person rescues over the years.

The Champion Lifesaver competition uniquely tests all aspects of lifesaving in one event. Phoebe Warriner was the sole youth competitor representing Seacliff and made us very proud. Initially told she placed third, then second, and finally, weeks later, that she had actually won gold—earning her a spot at Aussies, representing both Seacliff and the state.

The State Titles marked the culmination of months of hard work—training through a cold winter, countless pool laps, and pushing through fatigue from boards, swimming, sprint, and strength sessions. All that effort was focused on this weekend's events.

There were medals earned both in the water and on the beach, along with many near-misses and close fourth places. For more detailed placings at State Titles, head over to Sarah our Competition Coordinator's, report.

The final competition of the season was The Aussies, attended by a handful of youth—Phoebe, Keeley, Jordon, and Angus Needham—along with some fantastic under-13s: Ethan, Will, Lenny, Angus McRae, and Alfred. With day one cancelled due to weather, much had to be compressed into a single day. Despite the challenging conditions, the youth performed admirably in both water and beach events. Aussies highlights included the U13 sprint relay finishing in 5th place, Jordon placing 11th in the U15 swim, and the campaign concluding with Phoebe excelling in Champion Lifesaver

and Keeley proudly representing South Australia as a board paddler in the Youth Pathways Championships.

Throughout the season, the youth were involved in many other activities. Jo Goulder led the Ski Development program which brought out many youth and testing their balance on a ski, this was a huge success and extended beyond its initial six-week plan. A group were found wandering the streets with the under-9s selling Lion Christmas cakes, raising funds for both Lions and the club. Christmas festivities also included a Kris Kringle, where some gifts were perfect—and others, well, let's just say Jed looked fantastic in his Christmas rashie!

During Junior State Titles, many youths could be found all over the beach assisting as AGLs, providing first aid, running cake stalls, or pushing the mobile drinks and zooper dooper kiosk. They also helped with setting up and packing down the beach—a truly legendary group.

Again, our Nippers and clubbies represented walking door to door within the local community selling cakes to support both Lions and Seacliff Surf Club. This tradition remains a highlight for many Nippers and their families and great way to welcome the festive season.

Winter and Midweek Training Sessions – Commitment Beyond the Sand

Preparation and dedication at Seacliff Surf Life Saving Club extends well beyond the official Nipper season—and 2024/25 was no exception.

Our Winter Board Sessions began in July, ahead of the season's official start, with a solid group of Nippers showing up each week to brave the chilly conditions and train on the beach. These sessions played a vital role in helping Nippers maintain and develop their board and surf skills during the off-season, especially taking advantage of the windy winter conditions to gain valuable wave training experience.

Once the season commenced, so too did our comprehensive midweek training program, giving Nippers the chance to further develop across all disciplines. Participants had access to:

- Two additional board training sessions during the week
- Swimming training held at Morphetts State Swim and Westminster
- Sprint and beach flag training, both on the sand and Bowker Street Ovals

These sessions allowed our nippers to have some form of additional training every day of the week, providing well-rounded development opportunities across board, swim, and beach events—critical for both confidence and competition.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the dedicated team of volunteer coaches who give up their time and share their expertise with our young athletes. Their passion and commitment are what drive the success of these sessions, and we are deeply grateful for all they contribute.

A huge shout-out and heartfelt thanks to: Lori Chandler, Cameron Lindsay, Tony Scrivener, Justin Clark, Darryl Pope, Shauna Henty, Rachael Doughty and All who jumped in to assist throughout the season.

Carnivals – Team Spirit and Community on Show

As always, carnivals were a season highlight for those Nippers who chose to compete. Seacliff proudly continued its tradition of strong representation, fielding one of the largest contingents at each event, with an average of 110 Nippers participating across the Under 8 to Under 13 age groups.

Our team spirit was unmistakable. Whether it was having a go in unfamiliar events or standing at the finish line cheering on teammates, Seacliff Nippers consistently demonstrated what it means to compete with heart, enthusiasm, and sportsmanship.

This year's Country Carnival took us to Normanville, with another impressive turnout of families making the trip to support and compete. These events not only provide valuable experience for our young athletes but also offer a chance to deepen connections across the wider surf life saving community.

Given the size of our competitor numbers, Seacliff had significant official requirements to meet at each carnival. Thanks to the generosity and commitment of our parent group, we successfully filled every allocated position—no small feat, and one that Surf House took notice of and appreciated.

Personally, I'm incredibly proud of the way our families stepped up. It was yet another powerful example of the Seacliff spirit—a community that shows up, supports one another, and ensures our Nippers get every opportunity to shine.

State Titles – Showcasing Seacliff Spirit on Home Sand

The 2024/25 Junior State Championships were a true standout this season—not only for the exceptional performances by our Nippers, but for the incredible sense of unity, pride, and community that defined the entire event.

Day 1 of competition took us to Grange, where our Nippers faced wild and woolly conditions. The weather may have been challenging, but our team rose to the occasion with determination and heart, making their club proud by pushing through tough surf and showing what true grit looks like.

But it was Days 2 and 3, held on our very own Seacliff Beach, that took this year's championships to the next level. Hosting a State Titles event of this scale—welcoming over 6,000 spectators and competitors across the weekend—was no small task, but Seacliff delivered in spectacular fashion.

From logistics to atmosphere, the event has since been praised as one of the best-run State Titles in South Australian surf life saving history. And the real winners? Our entire Seacliff community.

Bringing an event of this magnitude to life required every corner of the club to unite, and they did—brilliantly. It was a whole-club effort, and every contribution mattered:

- Our Silver Salties kept the BBQ sizzling and prepped hundreds of lunches for volunteers
- Youth and Senior members staffed the patrol and first aid tents
- Bronze Medallion holders jumped in for essential water cover
- Parents and caregivers assisted with early morning set-up and late pack-down
- Our Boaties ran a buzzing beach bar that was loved by spectators and members alike

In addition to showcasing our incredible club culture, the event was a huge fundraising success, generating over \$20,000 with \$16,000 going to support the Nipper program and contribute to vital equipment and initiatives. This achievement is something that every volunteer, member, and supporter should be incredibly proud of.

Personally, hosting State Champs in my very first year as Junior Chairperson wasn't something I expected—but it has become one of my proudest and most rewarding achievements. I'm deeply grateful to every individual who helped make it all possible.

As always, team Seacliff spirit shone brightly. Our Nippers supported one another with loud cheers, high-fives, and endless encouragement, giving each event a red-hot go and embodying what surf life saving is all about.

Competition Highlights

Seacliff not only hosted the event with excellence but delivered strong results across multiple age groups and disciplines. A few standout achievements included:

- Logan McRae (U9) – Silver in Flags and Long Run
- Morgan Salier (U10) – Top 3 finishes in Boards, Flags, and Long Distance
- U10 Mixed Beach Relay – Silver, and Mixed Board Relay – Bronze
- U11 Teams – Top 3 in each Mixed Team Event
- U12 Board Rescue Finalists, finishing 4th after a spectacular sprint to the line
- U13 Flags Final – Lenny Espirito Santo (2nd) and Alfred Doughty (4th)
- U13 Mixed Beach Relay – 2nd and 3rd Place

Early September saw the club participate in the Gotcha 4 Life 24hr Row for Suicide Prevention for the 3rd year in a row! With participants from nippers to youth, seniors, IRB's, boaties, Silver Salties and management jumping on for a row or throwing their support behind this wonderful cause, our club raised just shy of \$10k for the foundation! This effort qualified us to go into the running for one of two Race One prize packs consisting of a 100kg Racing Mal and an adjustable ski, both valued at \$7,500!! 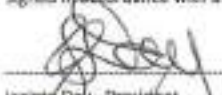

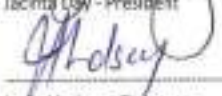

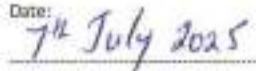

NOTE 1 - MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

Financial Reporting Framework

The Committee have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the association is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* and the *Associations Incorporation Act 1985*. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*, the *Associations Incorporation Act 1985*, and the are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous material accounting policy information disclosed below, which the directors have determined period unless stated otherwise.

Statement of Compliance

Seacliff Surf Life Saving Club Inc, a not-for-profit entity, has prepared special purpose financial statements as, in the opinion of the Committee, it is unlikely there are users of these financial statements who are not in a position to require the preparation of reports tailored to their information needs. Accordingly, these financial statements have been prepared to satisfy the Committee's reporting requirements under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Club has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards', AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures' and AASB 124 'Related Party Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) Financial Instruments

Recognition and Initial Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the club commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities other than financial guarantees are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial liability is derecognised.

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Committee reviews the carrying values of the Association's assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments.

(d) Revenue

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the incorporated association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

(d) Revenue (Cont)

Sales revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery.

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received. Where conditions are attached to the donation which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the donation, the recognition of the donation as revenue will be deferred until these conditions are satisfied.

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(a) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

(f) Inventories

Inventories

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and any impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than the recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present (refer to Note 1(B) for details of impairment).

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost, or for nominal cost, are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

(g) Property, plant and equipment (cont.)

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(h) Right-of-Use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the association expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of-use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The association has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

(i) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(j) Employee Provisions

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on corporate bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

(k) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(l) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Where the association retrospectively applies an accounting policy, makes a retrospective restatement or reclassifies items in its financial statements, a third statement of financial position as at the beginning of the preceeding period in addition to the minimum comparative financial statements must be presented.

(m) Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally paid within 90 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the association's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

(o) Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

(p) Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

(q) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the association for the annual reporting period ended 30 April 2025. The initial assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations is that there will not be a material impact on the Association.

(r) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The committee evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the association.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Club determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability and inflation have been taken into account.
